

EggCIENCE AND **TECH REPORT**

ow many times do I have to tell you?! Not while I'm. . . . Oh, I'm sorry. I thought you were Venkman. He's been sneaking up and giving me wedgies all week.

It's good to see you again, science buffs! We've got some interesting experiments, inventions and phenomena to look at today, so let's jump right into it. . . .

an eye peeled and you'll see the waves bounce off the sides and return to the penny. This is called wave motion.

Not bad, right? You can experiment with different sized objects, too, and see how well their waves bounce back. A rock, a soda can, a sponge or an old record are all good to

TRACKING THE

Wave motion is used in radar (which means Radio Detection and Ranging) and sonar (Sound Navigation and Ranging) tracking. Radar is used in airplanes and by the military, to track moving objects in the air or on the ground that are

too far for the naked eye to see. Sonar is mostly used to track objects in the water.

The two systems work by sending out a burst of beams through an antenna. For radar, the beams are microwaves; for sonar, they're sound waves. If the waves come back, they must be bouncing off of something. A form of sonar is also used by bats, which send out high-pitched squeaks as they fly. If the squeaks bounce back, they know something is in their

By timing the interval between sending out the waves and getting them back, it's easy to find out the distance between the antenna and the object. New radar systems can tell how fast an object is moving and what that object is. One radar station in Alaska is so powerful it can detect a basketball 3,100 miles away!

Radar used microwaves to "see" objects as far as 3,100 miles away! It can also sense an object's size and speed.



MAKING WAVES

I know this is going to sound like homework from your science class, but stay with me on it. First, fill a container-it can be your kitchen sink, a bathtub or any other square or rectangular container-with a few inches of water. Then wait for the water to become completely still.

Drop a penny into the water, not too near the sides of the container. You'll see tiny waves spread from where the penny hit the water. Keep

AROUND RADAR

The B-2 Bomber, also called the Stealth Bomber, can evade radar in two ways. First, it's shaped so that there's not much surface area for the radar signals to bounce off. Second, it's covered with a special material that absorbs microwaves, just as the sponge in the bathtub absorbs water and makes few waves.

DINOSAURS

One of the greatest mysteries of science is the sudden death of the dinosaurs, about 65 million years ago. But some scientists think they may have solved the puzzle.

Their idea is that a meteor weighing around one trillion tons (about six miles wide) slammed into the Earth. The collision released as much energy as five billion atom bombs!

The impact itself wouldn't have killed the dinosaurs. Rather, their extinction would

have been caused by the dust that the collision





I smiled and closed my eyes. But Egon didn't kiss me. Instead, he put something in my hands. Something smelly.


"A fish!?" I said.



Meet the world's most radical Ghostbusters collector!

ome people collect stamps. Some buy old comic books. But Peter Mosen has amassed one of the most awesome collections of all. Peter collects Ghostbusters memorabilia! And his interest in the ectoplasmic police began even before their first movie came out!

It all started back in 1984, Peter explains. "I found out about Ghostbusters coming out and I saw a poster at a science fiction convention. I looked at the costumes and I said to myself, 'Gee, I could make jumpsuits like those!'"

Even before ghostbusting became a household word, Peter was suited up for action! "Two weeks before the opening of the film," he says, "I saw a preview showing. I was in line wearing a full Ghostbusters costume!"

Peter says he has always found costumes, ghosts and science fiction fascinating. "I've been interested in making costumes since I was eight," he says. As a teenager, Peter collected rubber monster masks and made costumes.

His collection includes some truly amazing items. He has a 1959 Cadillac ambulance rigged out with the Ghostbusters' equipment and even the "Ecto-I" license plates from the original

film. He's also working on "Ecto-IA," the second Ghostbuster-mobile. "It takes a long time to get these things together," Peter says. "Everything I've done I've tried to do as best as I could."

And, he adds, "I have costumes for four guys, a ten-foot-tall Slimer and a seven-foot-tall Stay-Puft Marshmallow Man." Peter also landed a role in Ghostbusters II! He was on the set when a scene was being filmed with Peter Venkman and Dana Barrett in a high-class restaurant. Suddenly, in walk Egon, Winston and Ray, covered head to toe in slime! The

call went out-someone had to sit next to Peter and Dana and get slimed! "I volunteered. I didn't mind-I wanted to get slimed!" says Peter, laughing.

For Peter Mosen, being the next best thing to a real Ghost-buster has turned into more than a hobby—it's also his job! Remember the scene in Ghostbusters II when Ray and Winston try to entertain some kids at a birthday party! "They got that from me!" Peter says. "Every week I do at least one Ghostbusters birthday party, so that scene was a real compliment for me."

SUPERSTITIONS

Superstitions have been around thousands of years. Perhaps cavekids prepared for prehistoric spelling bees by tucking lucky rocks into the pockets of their leopard-skin T-shirts. We decided to take a look at some of the most common superstitions around today. Do *you* believe in any of them?



Lucky Rabbit's Foot

A rabbit's foot is supposed to be lucky for the person who carries it, even though it's not so lucky for the rabbit. Long ago, rabbits were worshipped as symbols of spring because they had so many offspring. But people also thought there was something scary about any animal that lived in the ground, where evil spirits were supposed to live. This mixture of good and bad made rabbits seem mysterious and powerful. Owning a piece of a magical animal was a way to share its power.


Diaries and letters show that 17th century people carried rabbits' feet to cure upset stomachs

and aching joints. Hundreds of years later, actors carried rabbits' feet in their makeup cases for good luck. And in rural England in the early 1900s, mothers protected their infants by putting rabbits' feet in baby carriages.

Wishbone Wishing

In ancient Rome people tried to predict the future by studying the insides of dead livestock, particularly fowl. Pretty gross, right? Scholars suppose that an ancient fortune-teller examined a bird, yanked out its *furcula* and invited a friend to grab the other end. The idea of making a wish with a *furcula*





didn't sound right, so people began calling it a wishbone—and we've been breaking them ever since.

Lucky Penny

Many people assume it's lucky to find a penny, especially if it's lying heads up. There are several reasons for this belief. For starters, metal-making, which involves heating raw ore in a very hot fire, seemed to be a magical process to our ancestors. Anything made out of metal, such as a horseshoe, was lucky. Also, money was believed to attract money. If you found one coin, more would follow.

The idea that heads-up is better than heads-down probably dates



back to ancient Rome. During the rule of Julius Caesar coins were stamped with his image on one side. When two friends couldn't settle an argument, they'd flip the coin and let the emperor decide who was right.

"God Bless You!"

One of the most common superstitions is saying "God bless you" when someone sneezes. This practice comes from the old idea that evil spirits leave the body with every "achoo." To protect themselves from free-floating fiends, Persians prayed after someone sneezed, while the Greeks and Romans wished the sneezer good health. By the 17th century, a European gentleman was expected



to take off his hat, bow and say, "God bless you." Today we skip the formality, but the response hasn't changed.

Step On a Crack...

Why don't we step on cracks? Experts say this belief dates back to the 16th century at least, when someone wrote this Mother Goose poem:



Step in a hole,
You'll break your mother's
sugar bowl.
Step on a crack,
You'll break your mother's back.
Step in a ditch,
Your mother's nose will itch.
Step in the dirt,
